8. Pattern of the lesson

8.1 Actualisation or recall of existing knowledge

The whole lesson is a recall lesson. We will go through the worksheet together and verbally discuss the work they have learned

8.2 Introduction of the lesson topic

This is continuation lesson. I will start by asking them what we were discussing then have them take out their worksheets. They will have 10minutes of class time to complete the lesson to enable learners who had more homework a chance to complete it.

8.3 Explanation of new subject matter.

Teacher contribution to lesson

The main part of this lesson will be focused on class discussions.

The teacher will need to make sure that they have the answers to the worksheet as well as having gone through the work again.

The teacher will then use the questions to link the independence of Namibia to the role of the churches, the UN and Resolution 435.

The teacher will ask them to explain who was important and why their input was important.

The teacher will need to make sure that the discussion is structured around the specific points of the Linkage policy and what would have happened if it was not agreed to. What would have happened if the SA troupes did not listen to the order to stay in barracks and then discuss 21March 1990 with the teacher.

Active learning by learners during the lesson

Learners have to complete a worksheet in class-independent learning and then they need to pay attention to answer the questions from their worksheet. They then need to apply the information to higher order verbal questions.

8.4 Monitoring the understanding of new subject matter during the lesson. While going through the worksheet with the learners I will gauge their understanding of the work verbally. Learners will read out their answers and we will discuss them.
